A new study from the CDC shows that two-thirds of cancer survivors remain alive 5 years after diagnosis. Advances in the diagnosis and treatment of cervical cancer have contributed to the improved outlook that cancer patients have today.

Since its introduction more than 50 years ago, routine Pap testing to screen for cervical cancer has reduced deaths from the disease by more than 70%. Effective prevention and improved screening strategies offer the potential to continue to reduce the number of women affected by cervical cancer in the near future.

Vaccinate Early - A Public Health Priority

Studies indicate the majority of cervical precancers appear to be caused by one of nine types of human papillomavirus (HPV). The U.S. Food and Drug Administration has approved three vaccines against HPV: a bivalent vaccine (Cervarix) that protects against the two most common oncology strains of HPV (16 and 18); a quadrivalent vaccine (Gardasil) that covers HPV 16, 18, 6, and 11; and a nine-valent vaccine (Gardasil 9) that incorporates the same protection as the quadrivalent product plus five additional oncogenic HPV strains -- 31, 33, 45, 52, and 58.

On Dec. 11, 2014, the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) approved the nine-valent HPV vaccine for girls and young women ages 9 to 26 years and boys 9 to 15. Data show that at least 85% to 90% of precancerous cervical lesions result from one of the nine HPV types covered in the vaccine. If vaccination programs are effectively implemented, the majority of cervical precancers and cancers could be prevented.

The CDC has declared HPV vaccination an important public health priority. According to the CDC, vaccination rates are unacceptably low compared with rates for other adolescent vaccines. Furthermore, the CDC estimates that an additional 53,000 cases of cervical cancer could be prevented in girls 12 years and older over their lifetimes by increasing HPV vaccination coverage to 80%. The CDC has also reported that for every year that the HPV vaccination rate does not improve, another 4,400 women will go on to develop cervical cancer.

Leading organizations have urged healthcare providers to recommend HPV vaccination with the same sense of importance used to recommend other adolescent vaccines. Healthy People 2020 vaccination goals of 80% coverage for adolescents (13 to 15 years old) are near or have been met for all recommended vaccines except HPV. If vaccination programs are effectively implemented with the nine-valent vaccine, approximately 90% of invasive cervical cancers cases worldwide could be prevented.

Regular Pap Tests, HPV Testing When Indicated

The latest guidelines for the prevention and early detection of cervical cancer -- released in 2012 by the American Cancer Society (ACS), the American Society for Colposcopy and Cervical Pathology (ASCCP), and the American Society for Clinical Pathology (ASCP) -- recommend the following:

- ✓ Women should not be screened with Pap tests before age 21.
- ✓ Women 21 to 29 should be screened with the Pap test alone (conventional or liquid-based) every 3 years. HPV testing should NOT be used for screening in this age group.
- ✓ For women 30 and over, the preferred approach is the Pap test plus HPV testing ("co-testing") every 5 years. Continued screening with the Pap test alone (without HPV testing) every 3 years is an acceptable alternative.
- ✓ Screening is not recommended for women older than 65 who have had at least three consecutive negative Pap tests or at least two negative HPV tests within the last 10 years, with the most recent test in the last 5 years. Women in this age group who have a history of cervical pre-cancer (CIN2 or more severe) should continue routine screening for at least 20 years, even if this extends beyond age 65.
- ✓ Women who have undergone a hysterectomy (with removal of the cervix) for reasons not related to cervical cancer or pre-cancer should no longer be screened.

In January, a working group representing multiple medical organizations released "interim guidance recommendations" regarding the use of the recently approved HPV DNA test. Published simultaneously in three medical journals, the interim guidance -- intended to aid clinical decision making until existing clinical guidelines have been updated -- characterized the HPV DNA test as a reasonable alternative to cytology and to co-testing (cytology plus DNA testing).

Greater access to routine cervical cytology and compliance with screening guidelines is imperative to reduce the incidence of cervical cancer.

New Treatments

In August 2014, the FDA approved bevacizumab (Avastin) to treat patients with persistent, recurrent or late-stage (metastatic) cervical cancer. Based primarily on results of the Gynecologic Oncology Group (GOG) 240 trial, the approval was for bevacizumab use in combination with paclitaxel plus either cisplatin or topotecan.

The key efficacy assessment in <u>GOG 240</u> demonstrated statistically significant improvement in overall survival in patients who received bevacizumab and chemotherapy compared with those who received chemotherapy alone (HR=0.74; 95% CI 0.58-0.94, P=0.013). The median survival of patients who received bevacizumab and chemotherapy was 16.8 months (95% CI 14.1-19), compared with 12.9 months (95% CI 10.9-15) for those who received chemotherapy alone.

The key to decreasing cervical cancer worldwide is screening and early vaccination. Novel treatment strategies will help cure and extend life for those women affected by the disease.

Lewin is director of gynecologic oncology at the Regional Cancer Center of Holy Name Medical Center in Teaneck, N.J. She also is a clinical faculty member at the Icahn School of Medicine at Mount Sinai in New York City.

New York-Presbyterian Hospital surgeon on mission to help low-income women

Cancer patient Cindy Martin (l.) of Washington Heights got first-rate care and has been in remission thanks to the efforts of Dr. Sharyn Lewin of New York-Presbyterian Hospital. When Cindy Martin opened her eyes after surgery for what her doctor hoped was just an ovarian cyst, she got the news every woman dreads. It was cancer.

"Am I gonna die?" the shaken home attendant from Washington Heights asked.

Martin's surgeon, New York-Presbyterian's Dr. Sharyn Lewin, reassured her patient.

"You're going to live a nice long life. It looks like we got it all in time."

Martin, 48, is among dozens of low-income Hispanic women who are able to get world-class medical care because of the northern Manhattan neighborhood they live in.

And particularly because of the caring of Lewin, a young, crackerjack surgeon who is on a mission to save women's lives - including those who have little or no access to medical care.

"Our patients from Washington Heights are just so grateful. It's very rewarding taking care of them," said Lewin, who sees about 10 new gynecological cancers a week in women from around the New York metro area.

Lewin's arrival at the W. 165thSt. hospital is like a homecoming for the Kansas native.

Born to New York parents and a long line of physicians, Lewin was most inspired at a young age by her pioneering grandmother, Dr. Gerda Bruno.

Bruno immigrated to New York in 1934 from Germany, and set up a private gynecology practice in Washington Heights unheard of for a woman in her day. She also worked part-time at the Margaret Sanger clinic helping women with birth control, something her male colleagues looked down upon.

"She was a huge influence on me," said Lewin, who is also a rare breed in the male-dominated surgical specialty. "I wanted to be a physician since second or third grade. And my earliest memories were of my grandmother talking to me about being a woman doctor and how it is to take care of women.

"Everything comes 360," she added. "So now I am back in New York practicing in Washington Heights. Isn't that funny?"

Lewin, 36, joined the gynecologic oncology division at Columbia University in 2009 after completing a fellowship at Memorial Sloan-Kettering Cancer Center. Last year she won the coveted "Physician of the Year" Award from the hospital.

She sees about 50 patients a week, about 40% of whom are from

the Heights. Lewin's ovarian cancer patients typically undergo 18 treatments of chemotherapy - targeted directly into the belly - over a four-month period after surgery.

"I feel good, thank God," said Martin, who has been in remission since 2009. "I get scared it can come back. But at least I know Dr. Lewin is here for me."

Lewin, who works with two male colleagues in the gynecological oncology department, is also starting up a pilot program next month called "Woman to Woman."

The program, modeled after one that has been operating for eight years at Mount Sinai Hospital, and funded primarly by the Ovarian Cancer Research Fund, will help newly diagnosed patients navigate the social and emotional turmoil that cancer visits upon them, their families and partners. Women will have access to a trained social worker and be matched up with a survivor for support.

"We have a war on cancer, but we have to broaden that from the operating room and chemotherapy to incorporate women's emotional needs to help them survive," said Lewin.

What to look out for to head off ovarian cancer

About 25,000 women in the U.S are diagnosed each year, and approximately 14,000 die from ovarian cancer.

Talk to your doctor about screening if you have a strong family history of ovarian or breast cancer or the genetic mutation known as BRCA 1 or 2.

Signs and symptoms:

- Prolonged bloating (more than 2 weeks)
- ✓ Feeling full while eating
- ✓ Vaginal bleeding or discharge that is not normal for you
- ✓ Pain or pressure in the pelvic or abdominal area
- Back pain
- ✓ A change in bathroom habits more frequent or urgent urination, constipation or diarrhea

Meet Dr. Sharyn N. Lewin, a Woman You Should Know who takes the concept of women helping women to a truly extraordinary level. As a board certified gynecological oncologist and surgeon, she cares for women with ovarian, endometrial, uterine, cervical, vulvar and vaginal cancers.

Born in Kansas to New York parents, Sharyn moved to Manhattan's NewYork-Presbyterian/Columbia University Medical Center in 2009, a few blocks away from where her grandmother, an OB GYN, practiced in the 40's and 50's.

As early as the second and third grades, her pioneering grandmother would tell Sharyn about how she emigrated to the United States from Germany in 1935 as a young physician. Once here, she opened a gynecology office in Washington Heights, NY. It was challenging, difficult, and exciting to be a woman doctor, helping women with birth control, and practicing at the Margaret Sanger Clinic when her male colleagues looked down on her and her medical care.

It was this influential and inspirational legacy, coupled with a phone call Sharyn received as a first year intern that set her on

her ultimate career path. The call was from a patient, a woman with a gynecologic cancer. She shared that story when she received the annual Gilda's Club It's Always Something award in 2013 saying, "These incredible women really inspired me to the core. I had never met such a kind, courageous, caring group of women, who maintained these attributes while battling cancer. I was driven to join their fight in the war against cancer. This is why I wanted to be a gynecologist."

Upon completing the prestigious Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center Gynecologic Oncology Fellowship, Dr. Lewin was appointed Assistant Clinical Professor of Obstetrics and Gynecology in the Division of Gynecologic Oncology at NYP/CUMC.

She is regarded as a national educator on Hereditary Breast and Ovarian Cancer Syndrome (HBOC) and is an expert in the state-¬of-¬the-¬art treatment for advanced ovarian cancer. Dr. Lewin lectures nationally and internationally and has won numerous teaching and research awards, including the prestigious Society of Gynecologic Oncology (SGO) President's Award. She has authored dozens of articles and textbook chapters and is a board member of Gilda's Club¬NYC, Susan G. Komen for the Cure and Teal¬Walk.

Sharyn is most proud of the Woman to Woman program she started in 2011 and medically directs at NYP/CUMC. Woman to Woman is the signature patient support program of the Ovarian Cancer Research Fund. Women, their families and partners receive one-¬to-¬one emotional support by trained volunteers while undergoing treatment for gynecologic cancer.

Dr. Lewin recalls that when she was discussing her choice to pursue gyn oncology, her family spoke with a close friend with ovarian cancer. She told her family, "Please ask her what she thinks of her gynecologic oncologist." As it turned out, that woman's physician meant everything to her. In response, Sharyn said, "I want to be that person."

And today she most certainly is.
